SAMSON

Scripture: Judges 13-16

Memory Verse: Galatians 6:7

Do not be deceived, God is not mocked, for whatever a man sows, this he will also reap.

Materials:

Picture cards of story Several of the same item Blindfold for MV/pack of seeds

Objectives: As a result of this lesson, I want my students

To Know: that Samson was set apart by God in order to drive out the Philistines, Samson lived mainly for his own self-indulgent desires and broke his Nazirite vow, and his life ended up bringing shame to himself and God among the Philistines.

To Realize: The believer is set apart to be holy to God and accomplish His purposes. No matter how it seems for awhile, living for their own self-indulgent desires will bring shame to them and God.

To Respond: by living according to God's holy purpose and not according to one's own self-indulgent desires.

Setting Up the Story—

Bring in several of one item...example: twelve paper clips, or forks, or plastic cups, or toothpicks. (the item doesn't matter but they need to be all the same). Show the items to your students and tell them that ONE of them is Very Special. And ask them if they can tell which one it is. (of course, all the objects look identical) Then pick the one you have decided beforehand is the "special" one. Tell the students that even though all of the toothpicks (or whatever object you have chosen) look the same you have SET APART one of them for something special...and THAT is why it is different.

Note: you can do this with several objects so that they can see the pattern that it is NOT the object that has anything different about it that makes it "special" but because it has been "set apart" by you, the teacher for a "special purpose." Have pieces of paper with the names of several nations on it. (You can use OT Bible nations if you would like.) Have "Israel" on one of the pieces. Select it out and say that God chose and set apart the nation of Israel out of all the nations to have a "special purpose."

When something or someone is set apart for God's special purpose, it is said to be Holy. It means it is different from all the other things that look just like it, because it is going to be used for God's service, and God is a holy God.

The nation of Israel was set apart to show the nations what God was like. They were supposed to live by God's good laws. But they had started worshipping the gods of the other nations again. They were acting like they were NOT set apart to be different. What would happen?

We've seen how God would let other nations cause problems for the special nation of Israel, and that is what happened again. The Philistines made life very hard for them! And once again they cried to God for help!

And out of all the babies that are being born at that time, God is going to set one apart to be special for His purpose of delivering the Israelites from the Philistines. Let's find out about this "special" "set apart" baby!

Concluding the story:

There was nothing "different" about Samson except that he was set apart to do what God wanted--but instead of living for what God wanted, he lived his life doing what HE wanted...he was living like those without God. For awhile it looked like he was getting away with it, but Samson was deceiving himself. He was getting further and further away from God. At the end, Samson was really ashamed of what he had done. Instead of the Philistines knowing more about God, they made fun of God because of what Samson had done. When we trust in Jesus, we are set apart for His purposes. Is there anything that you are doing or saying that you know is not like Jesus? Is there sin that you are hiding and thinking, "Well, nothing has happened, so it's no big deal"? We do not want to be ashamed

SAMSON HELPS FOR THE TEACHER

Personal Application Questions:

1. Has there ever been a time in your life when you were 'doing' God's work, but you were still living for yourself?

2. Is there anything in your life currently that you allow yourself to indulge in that you feel is not totally pleasing to the Lord?

3. Have you personally know any believers who have brought shame to themselves, their families, or the Lord through their self-indulgent choices? What led to their shame? How was it exposed?

4. What steps will you take to ensure that you do not bring shame on God's name or on your own life?

Application Questions to think through for your Students:

1. To what extent do you feel that your students are tempted by the desire to try to live for themselves while at the same time trying to follow God? (being double-minded or living like the world)

2. In your opinion, do your students see the danger of living a self-indulgent lifestyle?

3. To what degree are your students tempted with lust or sexual images/actions from their surroundings? What other ways do the temptations around them affect them?

Memory Verse:

Galatians 6:7

<u>Do not be deceived</u>, <u>God is not mocked</u>, for <u>whatever a man sows</u>, this <u>he will</u> <u>also reap</u>.

Get a blindfold and each time reading through the verse pick a different student to put the blindfold on to say the phrase: "Do not be deceived." Explain that a person is deceived when they "can't see" the truth about a situation; it's when they are tricked. Samson was deceived about treating his calling casually and thinking all was still good. And he eventually "couldn't see" when he was blinded! God is not mocked: pretend laughter. People laugh at God's ways when they think they are getting away with wrong things.

Give a seed from the seed pack to a different student (for them to keep) each time through the verse: "whatever a man sows"

Point to the cover of the seed packet: "THIS he will also reap."

Post-Lesson Activity:
